Religious Education









Religious Education at St Joseph's Catholic College is the main element of the college's Catholic life and mission. This dimension of the school encompasses the spiritual and intellectual aspects of Christianity in the Catholic tradition. Catholic life and mission is the raison d'etre for the college and as such, a pursuit of personal excellence in this subject is expected. Religious Education is a key learning area and by the time students leave in Year 12 they should have a clear understanding of Christianity in the Catholic tradition. As a key learning area Religious Education aims to promote religious literacy.

Complementing the academic rigour occurring in the Religious Education classroom are the fabulous reflection days and retreats coordinated so capably by our Youth Ministry Coordinator and Leader of Mission, Fiona Green. This year we were most fortunate to have a variety of priests from our local parishes to celebrate the Eucharist most Thursdays at lunchtime.

In Stage 4 the emphasis is on enabling all students to consolidate an understanding of what Catholics believe and to develop confidence in reading and understanding the scriptures. Exploration of the life and times of Jesus is especially crucial for students to understand what it means to follow in the footsteps of Jesus. There is also an emphasis on participation and community building.

This year, as previously, Year 7 were lucky enough to be able to visit Mary MacKillop Place in North Sydney. Apart from the exciting bus trip there and back, there were two experiences that helped the students understand more about what it means to belong to both a school in the Josephite tradition and a school that is distinctly Catholic. These two experiences were: an informative tour

of the museum and chapel; and an invaluable talk by Suzy McIntyre, Caritas Australia's Program Coordinator - Global Programs & Partnerships.

Stage 5 curriculum emphasised Jesus, His radical call to social justice and the requirements of discipleship. Students focused on how to discover, celebrate, understand and find ultimate meaning in life.

Students in Year 9 examined the portrait of Jesus in Luke's Gospel, investigated the sacraments of healing and forgiveness, gave an oral presentation on another Christian denomination in Australia, and explored the implications associated with being a disciple of Jesus in contemporary society.

Year 10 are now proficient in understanding Catholic ethical teaching, can appreciate Catholic beliefs and practices, and have been taught the values underpinning the call to Catholic social justice. Students were given the opportunity to join a specialist Youth Ministry class in Term 3 which gave them the experience of planning and facilitating the Year 8 Reflection Day - which was a great success.

Students in Stage 6 have the choice of pursuing Catholic Studies, a course endorsed but not determined by the NSW Education Standards Authority, or Studies of Religion, a course determined by the NSW Education Standards Authority. Catholic Studies aims to deepen the students' knowledge of Christianity in the Catholic tradition, whilst Studies of Religion aims to foster an understanding of religion in Australia and the major faith traditions. All students visited the Gallipoli Mosque in order to more fully understand this faith tradition.

From a staff perspective, much emphasis has been placed on professional and spiritual development.

Many staff participated in in-services for Mission Formation, an initiative from the Catholic Schools Office to deepen staff appreciation of their vocation as teachers in a Catholic school. The highlight of the year for staff was our Spirituality Day held at St Joseph's Spirituality Centre, South Kincumber. The day explored Pope Francis' Laudato Si, his encyclical on the environment, and provided workshops to help staff become aware of ways they could live more sustainably.

As always our genuine thanks extend to the parents, the primary educators of their children in faith, for your support in the privilege of educating your daughters in Religious Education.

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Learning and Teaching























We are extremely proud of the academic achievements and successes of our students in 2017. Academic results continue to be impressive with St Joseph's students performing strongly in the Higher School Certificate and a variety of external competitions. We also achieved strong NAPLAN results this year with many of our Year 9 students meeting the new requirements in literacy and numeracy to be eligible for their HSC.

This club also assisted the college during the year to support seven students from Year 10 participate in the RYPEN leadership program. We appreciate their ongoing support.

Finally, all the staff deserve to be congratulated on the role they play in helping students reach their potential and develop into strong and healthy individuals. Student Support







Nothing is so awful we can't talk to someone

My role as school counsellor at the college is to provide an open, caring and confidential place where students are listened to and assisted with navigating the many changes and challenges of adolescence.

For the students

This year I have worked with the wellbeing team in implementing positive mental health strategies for coping with life's challenges, reducing stress, anxiety and increasing awareness of positive mental health:

- For senior students we have implemented the Batyr program, which aims to teach students positive help seeking behaviours and to smash the stigma associated with having to deal with a mental health issue.
- I ran sessions in the 2017 pastoral program for Year 12 and Year 11 on stress management.
- Year 10 attended sessions about understanding anxiety and what can be done about it.
- In conjunction with some Year 11 helpers we held small group sessions for Year 8 about encouraging positive relationships.

October was Mental Health Awareness month and the college theme for this month was 'Share the Journey'. The focus was on student social connections in life's journey and improved mental health and also having the ability and tools to cope with life's challenges.

For parents and carers

As well as working with individuals and with small groups of students in counselling, I liaise with parents, carers and teachers in relations to student mental health issues for the safety and wellbeing of young people.

Each year I conduct a four week program in Term 1 for Year 7 parents called Parenting Teens. This program provides positive assistance in navigating the challenges of teenagers in today's society.

In conjunction with Catholic Care I also conduct a six week Tuning into Teens program that teaches parents and carers how to become an emotional coach for their teenager. The skills taught in emotional regulation have life-long benefits for both parents and teenagers.

Throughout 2017 I have worked with the Leader of Student Wellbeing and Lifeline to facilitate self-harm and suicide prevention information sessions for parents and staff.

This year the College was involved in celebrating three significant events on the Aboriginal Education calendar: Sorry Day, NAIDOC Week and Indigenous Parents and Carers Engagement Day.

Sorry Day was commemorated on May 26th. This day highlights an awareness of the mistreatment of the Aboriginal and Torres Strait community due to government policies and the action of the "Bringing them home" report, tabled on the 26th May 1997.

NAIDOC is an acronym for National Aboriginal and Islander Day Observance Committee (NAIDOC). The committee was originally designed in the 1920s and has now evolved into a significant week as it celebrates the history, culture and achievements of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples.

NAIDOC week is celebrated in the first week of July. The college held a combined assembly recognising NAIDOC week and Sorry Day on the last week of Term 2, where we invited Karen Chapman (AEW for Holy Cross, Kincumber) to share the importance of NAIDOC week in the community.

The annual Indigenous Parents and Carers Engagement Day which was held in June recognised Aboriginal Education within the Broken Bay Diocese. It was a day that celebrated Indigenous culture and acknowledged the success and progress of Indigenous education. The day was held at Holy Cross Kincumber and opened with a performance from the boys from The Glen Centre. The performance was then followed by a presentation by the Diocesan Aboriginal Education Workers which included workshops to show parents and carers some of the strategies that are used in schools, and touched on how using every day activities encourages our kids with their education giving them the support that they need. At the conclusion of the workshops, we were then treated to a beautiful lunch which was provided by our very own Year 11 Food Tech. class

The day was a great success. All the parents and carers not only went away with some tools to engage with their children, but also with the confidence that their child's education is our number one priority.

Student Support

LEARNING SUPPORT AND LIFE SKILLS

The Learning Support faculty aims to help cater for the needs of students who learn differently and may have difficulties with reading, spelling and writing. Our role is to liaise with teachers, students and parents to determine the most appropriate approach to the students' individual learning needs. This is implemented in a number of ways: in-class support, co-teaching, small group withdrawal, adjustments to programs and assessment, alternative programs for students following a Life Skills pattern of study as well as a Life Skills class.

This year the Learning Support faculty has supported classes from Years 7 – 12. In addition to in-class support, the games room operated every lunchtime and homework help every Monday, Wednesday and Friday at lunchtime. The faculty also conducted typing lessons every Tuesday and Wednesday during Homeroom, intensive reading sessions and literacy groups.

The Life Skills class had students from Years 7, 8 and 10 who were taught English, Maths, Science, HSIE and French by the learning support teachers. The subjects were taught around a common theme taken from 'James and The Giant Peach' by Roald Dahl for semester one and 'My Place' by Nadia Wheatley for Semester 2.





In Science the girls studied living and non-living things. They looked at plant and animal cells and conducted an experiment with celery and dye to see how water travels from the roots to the leaves in plants. They also cultivated some seeds and observed what happens when sunlight is removed. The students also learnt about the skeletal and digestive systems. In Semester 2 the students studied forces and how they impact on everyday life. They conducted many experiments which they enjoyed immensely.



In Mathematics the students have practised number skills, time, money and shapes throughout the year.

Semester 1 focused on Geography and fine tuning of mapping skills. The lessons in this topic again took inspiration from 'James and the Giant Peach' as the students mapped the journey James took and then looked closer to home at local areas. To finish off the Geography topic the students took a close look at adverse weather and its effects on the environment and society.


In Semester 2 the students learned about Australian History - starting with Aboriginal culture and following on with the first white settlers' journey from England to Australia and their life once settled in Australia. The students have had opportunities to be imaginative with tasks such as creating a menu for a bush tucker food truck, posing as convicts and

creating a wanted poster that showed the crime they committed and their punishment as being sent to Australia for seven years hard labour. The students have had to work hard with imagining life before electricity and have contributed well to class discussions about the Aboriginal and convict way of life. With this knowledge they have been able to create an advertisement selling tickets to move from England to Australia. This task taught the students to understand persuasive language techniques. This topic continued in Term 4 exploring how separate colonies became the nation as we know it today.





English Life Skills class read about the adventures of James Henry Trotter's parents who had been eaten by a rhinoceros, how he escaped from his two repulsive aunts and that they went on a great adventure with some amazing characters when studying the novel 'James and the Giant Peach' by Roald Dahl in Semester 1. On their journey through the book students engaged with their learning and comprehension using a variety of fun activities, quizzes and art followed by watching the movie to bring the book to life.



In Semester 2 the students studied 'My Place' by Nadia Wheatley & Donna Rawlins - an English study of Australia blending historical and imaginative fiction where the characters are linked through family across generations. To support this text and provide a deeper level of learning and high engagement the students also studied 'My Place' through ABC TV watching the television adaptation of the story which provided depth into the characters they were reading about.

Bonjour! The Year 8 French Life Skills students have been busy working on French numbers, colours, months of the year, farm animals and food. The students learnt songs, played colour bingo, French number dominos, interactive and matching games as well as using Language Perfect to support their learning. Students also had the opportunity to go on an excursion to Alliance Francaise in Sydney where they engaged in French language and enjoyed a croissant and hot chocolate.

MASSES AND LITURGIES

Masses and liturgies continue to play a very significant role in our school celebrations. On 22nd June we celebrated our school's 50th anniversary with a celebration of the Eucharist with Bishop Peter A Comensoli. We marked Holy Week together with St Edward's College through a moving liturgy and we celebrated the Feast of St Joseph and the Feast of Mary of the Cross MacKillop through Eucharistic celebrations.

SENIOR YOUTH MINISTRY TEAM

Eight Year 11 students committed to joining the Senior Youth Ministry Team in 2017. Despite a busy academic year the girls contributed to our college by assisting in the Ash Wednesday Liturgy and the Year 10 Reflection Day. Where possible the students also participated in the Catholic life of the college through participation in the Social Justice immersions, Praisefests and volunteering at Vinnies Breakfasts.

INDIA IMMERSION

In April this year we took students in Year 11 on a transformative immersion experience to Mumbai in India. Our group of eight students and two staff spent ten days at Mermier Bal Ashram which is a home for very poor and disadvantaged children. Our visit was hosted by the Fransalian Fathers who do wonderful work with these children as well as children in local slums. We also experienced a five day cultural tour prior to our stay in Mumbai visiting New Dehli, Agra, and Varanasi. Here are some student reflections of our 2017 trip:

YEAR 10 YOUTH MINISTRY CLASS

In Year 10 students have the opportunity to choose to be in a Youth Ministry focussed Religion class that includes an added Youth Ministry dimension. In 2017 we had one Youth Ministry class taught by Ms Wedmore that took on extra faith forming activities and developed skills that empowered





them to do peer-to-peer ministry within the college and in their local parish community. These students proudly developed and ran an excellent Reflection Day for Year 8 and also ministered to children at East Gosford Public School by assisting the catechists with their classes each week.

RETREATS & REFLECTION DAYS

A retreat/reflection day is . . .

- a pause from the "business" of everyday life
- an opportunity to strengthen friendships
- a time for quiet prayer and reflection in a peaceful atmosphere
- an opportunity to build and strengthen friendships and promote understanding between students and teachers
- a fun 'time-out' for recreation, games, songs, learning and play.

Retreats and reflection days play an important role in the faith formation of our students. In 2017 Year 7 to Year 10 had a reflection day and Years 11 and 12 participated in overnight retreats.

The major focus of our retreats and reflection days is on spirituality, with students sharing liturgies, Eucharist celebrations, group discussions and individual reflections. The experience is overwhelmingly positive, with students gaining new insights about themselves and each other. The following are some comments from students after our Year 11 Retreat.

"I expected it to be solely religious however it was so fun and really positive and engaging as well. I absolutely loved every minute. I loved being engaged with heaps of different groups of girls and developing a stronger relationship with them. On retreat I learned that God is always there to listen and we are never alone."

"I learned that God has given us an opportunity to live life to the full on this amazing planet."

"I became more confident in myself and my beliefs and more open to the Catholic faith.'













PRAISEFEST

Young people from across the Diocese of Broken Bay gathered once a term at 'Praisefest' to catch up with friends while they enjoyed the preevent festivals, encountered God through vibrant and honest worship, and received spiritual nourishment through inspiring and relevant messages.

SOCIAL JUSTICE GROUP

Our very active Social Justice Group meet once a week at lunchtime. This year the group's activities were inspired by Pope Francis' second encyclical - Laudato Si' and looked at the issues of clean water and single use plastics. The group worked on raising awareness for those people in Africa who do not have access to clean water. They were surprised to discover that the average Australian uses 340 litres of water every day. But many people in developing countries walk six kilometres on average at least twice a day, while facing obstacles such as thorn bushes, just to get water that isn't even safe to drink.

To raise awareness of this issue in our community, we held a Water Challenge one lunchtime. Teams of 5 to 7 students carried 340 litres of water along a marked course over the lunchtime period. This gave them the chance to experience just a small portion of the hard work that many women endure every day just to get enough water to survive. They learned that water is a necessity we all need to survive and no one should be deprived of their right to clean water. This activity was also a big reminder of how much water we use and potentially waste every single day.

VINNIES BREAKFAST

Together with Sacred Heart Ettalong-Umina and St John the Baptist Woy Woy Vinnies Conferences we hold a barbecue on the first Saturday of each month to serve breakfast to our local marginalised people at Memorial Park Woy Woy. In 2017 we had a small group of very committed Year 11 students who cooked and served a breakfast of bacon, eggs, sausages, tea and coffee for up 22 people at time. Our guests also enjoyed chats about fishing, football and life in general. The breakfast event is now in its eighth year and gives our college community another opportunity of assisting people who need not just a meal but some social contact as well. Our students and staff do a wonderful job turning out in all weather and are a shining example of Christian love and service.

COAST SHELTER

A large number of Year 12 students and staff from our college volunteer each month at the Coast Shelter Community Centre. Our groups prepare meals for members of the local community that are in need of help. Coast Shelter is a not-for-profit charity based on the central coast which provides accommodation and support programs for people who are homeless or at risk of homelessness. The community centre provides free meals, assessment, referral and support to help homeless, vulnerable, financially disadvantaged and socially isolated community members. It is open to anyone needing assistance.

THE AUSTRALIAN CATHOLIC YOUTH FESTIVAL

Throughout Term 4, 31 students from Year 9, 10 and 11 have been participating in preparation for the Australian Catholic Youth Festival (ACYF). The festival is being held at Olympic Park, Homebush and the Domain in Sydney from 7 to 9 December 2017. The event is a national gathering of Catholic young people established by the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference (ACBC). It exists to provide young people with opportunities to deepen their relationship with Jesus, be empowered to be disciples in the world today and encounter and celebrate the vitality of the Church in Australia.

India Immersion























In April, eight Year 11 students embarked on a life changing immersion into the way of life for people living in India.

The tour began experiencing the rich culture of India as soon as we arrived in Delhi to the chaotic traffic where it appears every car, bike, scooter, rickshaw and pedestrian chooses to do as they please rather than follow any road rules. By train we travelled from Delhi to Agra and were awed by the majesty of the Taj Mahal and the Red Fort. From Delhi we travelled to Varanasi –the spiritual heart of India – to learn more of Buddhism and the Hindu traditions culminating with a sunset cruise along the Ganges River. We then moved into home for the next ten nights – Merrier Bal ashram in Mumbai – where we were privileged to be invited into the lives of the boys who stay and are cared for at the ashram.

While in Mumbai the girls experienced life in a rural boys ashram, a girls only ashram, travelled to the slums of Mumbai with the School on Wheels, toured a leper and AIDS hospice, met the sisters of Mother Teresa working with disadvantaged women, and built beautiful and enduring friendships with the boys and staff at Merrier Bal Ashram.

"Going to India was like entering a new world. We were confronted by things we had never seen before, with new places, food, people and heat."

"India is an amazingly beautiful and unique country but it's the people that make this immersion such an amazing and rewarding experience. Not only did we meet such great kids over our stay but we learnt a great deal about ourselves - our resilience to cope in confronting situations and how rich our lives are. We live blessed lives and we should be thankful for all our opportunities and for all we have, especially our families and our friends."

Our time here was unlike anything we have ever experienced before and we are far richer having learned how the people of India live with happiness and hope without the material things we deem important.

"My most surprising moment came from the people living in the slums of Mumbai. These people had very little - their homes were nothing more than the cubby houses we used to make in the backyard when I was little,

just wood pallets and tin. They were very basic yet families lived here. I expected these places to feel sad or the people living here to be angry or depressed but reality was the complete opposite. These families were full of joy, welcoming us into their homes, they had such strong family units. It really highlighted how different our society is - we spend our lives wanting more, more money, more material things but never feeling fulfilled with what we have. These people had nothing but they had joy and love. They were happy with each other -- we can learn so much from these people - rather than thinking those new shoes or that new dress will make you happy just choose to be happy. No amount of material things will ever fill your heart - better to just make the conscious choice to look at everything you do have in your life now - not what you don't."

We are so thankful to Father Francis, the brothers, sisters and staff at Merrier Bal Ashram and especially to the boys who accepted us and became our friends and shared their lives with us. India is an amazingly beautiful and unique country but it is the people that make this immersion such an amazing and rewarding experience. Not only did we meet such great kids over our stay but we learned a great deal about ourselves - our resilience to cope in confronting situations and how rich our lives are. We live blessed lives and we should be thankful for all our opportunities and for all we have, especially our families and our friends.

Warmun Immersion































Again this year our experience in Warmun was amazing. Each year we build stronger ties to the community and get greater insights into their culture. One story that struck a chord with me in terms of explaining their connection to land was written by Year 11 student Emma S. Her insights show the impact of time with these people.

I cannot explain enough how much this trip meant to us. Not only were we opened to new exciting experiences but the connections we made with the indigenous community will never be forgotten. I think we can agree that this trip has inspired us immensely and opened our hearts to the Aboriginal community and their amazing culture.

My experience from the immersion had a massive impact on my view of the indigenous culture and the tight connection they have as a community and to their land. One thing that stood out for me was the two way system which was taught in the school where the students were educated about both Aboriginal spirituality and Christianity, creating a religious foundation for the community to encourage and support future relationships between the different cultures.

The land that Gija people had once walked freely upon for thousands of years was pastoralised in the late 19th century – fenced off and divided into cattle stations, forcing the Gija people off their land and more often than not into slavery. These large cattle stations are obviously still in operation and one of them, Lissadell Station, is managed by the parents of a couple of white students who attend the school.

My story is concerned with the wisdom of a little Gija boy called Johnny. Johnny is a cheeky little kid with the widest and most infectious smile you'll ever see and I was privileged one morning to hear about his weekend adventures. Some talked about fishing down at the river and others talked about what games they had played in the streets. Then a couple of the Aboriginal boys piped up and said "We went hunting on MacKenzie's land". Without hesitation, Johnny replied, "Nah, nah, that's our land and it always will be!"

For a little boy, still so young, to be so confident and proud in making such a statement truly brought home to me the strength of their connection to land and how they have suffered through dispossesion of it. Johnny's statement is a testimony that these kids, despite their dreadful history and constant challenges, are an inspiration and source of strength.

The inaugural Reading Cup will be awarded for the first time in 2018. Girls who are currently in Year 9 will be eligible to win the cup if they have received a certificate at any level this year and next.

July 2017 marked the 20th anniversary of the publication of Harry Potter and the Philosopher's Stone. To mark the occasion, we held a Harry Potter day in the library. Girls sampled sweets from Honeydukes; enjoyed a non-alcoholic Butterbeer; discovered their Patronus, their 'Potterworld' job and name; tried out for Quidditch and entered the very challenging quiz. Prizes were awarded for best costumes. The library was full of wizards, witches, Aurors, Hogwarts' students and, of course, Muggles. 












MUSIC

YEAR 7 MUSIC

This year we have introduced basic skills for a range of instruments including drum kit, guitar, ukulele and keyboard. The students learnt to play a range of songs such as "Like a Drum" by Guy Sebastian, the 12 bar blues, "Don't Worry Be Happy", "Lanterns", "Ode to Joy" amongst others. They have learnt both chords and melody and have experimented with finger picking on guitar and ukulele as well. This year, Year 7 have studied Music for the whole year. The students have been able to develop both solo and ensemble skills to a higher level and have acquired strong skills in the reading and writing of music using traditional notation. 'Battle of the Bands' was experienced on a regular basis and the students were very keen to win prizes for best performances.

YEAR 8 MUSIC

In Year 8 guitar is always a popular choice. This year we have focused on ensemble skills through the performance task where students have been required to prepare a piece for performance with at least one other musician. We have worked to create small ensembles with drums, guitar, keyboard and vocals. This is always a healthy challenge for the students. Working in a band is not always as easy as it seems and therefore students this year were given the option of performing something prepared in class or for those learning music outside of school to perform something from their own repertoire.

This enthusiastic group of students came up with some fantastic twelve bar blues compositions using improvisation. Many of the students in this class have been keen to contribute to the co-curricular dimension of the college through choir, the 50th anniversary celebrations as well as school Masses and formal assemblies. The students enjoyed their practical lessons and have worked very well in small ensembles performing and creating original arrangements. "Literature is where I go to explore the highest and lowest places in human society and in the human spirit, where I hope to find not absolute truth but the truth of the tale, of the imagination and of the heart." —Salman Rushdie

The English faculty succeeded in providing the 2017 students with a rigorous, engaging and innovative curriculum which is aimed at developing an ability to think independently, critically and analytically. Students in all years have been exposed to a selection of texts and authors from different time periods and contexts. Many of the texts deal with concerns that are relevant both to Australian society and the students themselves.

Years 7 - 10 students have found themselves questioning and developing their understanding of concepts such as racism, feminism, resilience, love, jealousy, respect and cultural diversity through novels, plays, poetry and films such as 'Honey Spot', 'Once', 'Parvana', Mao's Last Dancer', 'The Secret Life of Bees' and 'Mona Lisa Smile'. They have been introduced to the world of Shakespeare and the impact of poetic language through well-known dramas such as 'Twelfth Night', 'Romeo and Juliet' and 'Macbeth'. Senior students in the Advanced English course continued their appreciation of Shakespeare through studying 'Othello' and 'The Tempest'. The Standard English students explored ideas such as friendship and alienation through their close study of the free verse novel 'Jinx'. Senior students also developed an understanding of concepts such as 'Journey', 'Discovery' and 'Into the World'. Students have also been equipped with the skills to deconstruct their texts providing them with the skills necessary to understand how words and images can influence their world.

Technology has also become a valuable aid in the teaching of English to students at all levels. Students from Years 7 - 9 are utilising their computers in all English classes as part of their everyday classroom learning. They have created online magazines on Google sites, created short stories/animation, created PowerPoints, Prezis and animations using Animoto.

Through excursions and incursions, students have had the opportunity to be exposed to live performances and informative presentations which are an integral part of bringing the curriculum to life. Earlier in the year the Year 12 Standard English students were fortunate to view a performance of 'Away' at the Sydney Opera House. The students enjoyed the play and, for some, this was a unique opportunity to visit this remarkable building. Year 12 Advanced English students were also fortunate to view a performance of the classic Shakespearean play 'The Tempest'. Additionally Years 9 and 10 students were exposed to a variety of Australian poetry in an interesting and unique presentation from the team 'Poetry in Action'.

The English staff are congratulated for their ongoing commitment to the students. HSIE



HSIE is the study of people and their interactions with all aspects of the world, including the part they play in the environment, in history, in the commercial world and in society in general. It encompasses many subjects that enable students to become active, responsible and informed citizens and enhance their desire for lifelong learning. The development of critical thinking skills and 21st century skills is also an important basis within this key learning area.

School excursions and incursions have always been a critical part of enhancing student understanding and engagement in our subjects and 2017 was no exception.

Stage 4 Year 7 Geography visited the Blue Mountains National Park to support their study of the landscapes and landforms component of the Geography syllabus. This involved a bushwalk in and around Wentworth Falls guided by members of the National Parks and Wildlife Services. An Aboriginal cultural presentation titled 'The Sustainable Toolkit' was also included on the day. Year 8 History students experienced an entertaining performance and activity day about Medieval Europe which allowed them to interact with a variety of Medieval customs and characters.

Stage 5 Year 10 History students visited the Sydney Jewish Museum to build on their understanding of the Holocaust and they had the unique opportunity to hear the personal story of a Holocaust survivor. Year 9 students also had the same opportunity in September. The Year 10 Geography excursion to local central coast beaches allowed students to put their field work skills into practice and personally explore a variety of issues affecting our beaches. The students also had the opportunity to listen to the very engaging coastal geomorphologist Dr Rob Brander explain the scientific processes of our beaches and the surf.


Stage 6 Year 11 Geography students were able to apply their field work skills on an excursion to the sand dunes at North Entrance. Year 12 Geography students undertook two field trips, one to Sydney to assist with their understanding of their topic on urban dynamics and the other to the Hunter Valley wine region to complement their studies on viticulture. On a separate excursion these same students were able to observe fragile ecosystems in the Mount Kosciusko area. To support their course work

in Year 11 Legal Studies, students visited the Downing Centre Courts in Sydney to experience the Australian legal system in operation. Our HSC Legal Studies students were visited by a lawyer from Legal Aid NSW to give them valuable insights into young offenders and how they are treated by the law and Watt's McCray Law Firm also made time to send two lawyers to assist in consolidating the girls' knowledge of family law. The students were also visited by an environmental lawyer from the Environmental Defender's Office (EDO NSW) which assisted in consolidating their knowledge of domestic responses to global and local environmental issues. Year 12 Business Studies students had the opportunity to visit Taronga Zoo to examine the marketing methods and strategies of this iconic Australian brand.

LOTE - French



Learning a modern European language is a valuable skill which provides many benefits. Importantly, it encourages the use of imagination and develops reading, writing, listening and language skills. It also helps to build a sense of identity. We have had an exciting year in French classes with our students celebrating a new culture, a new language, new events and shared experiences.

The Year 8 French students have had a very busy year of language learning. The students have shown a keen interest and enthusiasm for this beautiful Latin language.

Providing opportunities to explore both language and culture is an integral part of second language acquisition. In Term 1 the students created an interesting assignment on French culture and tourism. The students had to create and plan a holiday package for a family of four to a French speaking country and in addition, create a colourful holiday brochure of their chosen region. It was a challenging assignment, yet a fantastic opportunity to learn some new research skills and gain an insight into the Francophone countries in Europe and elsewhere. The completed projects were very unique and opened up the students' minds to a world of new facts and cultures of French speaking communities around the world.

In Term 3, Year 8 students explored the concept of family. They looked at different family structures and family trees and discussed the differences and common features in families. Students also looked at how we differ from our friends, family or others in the community. This gave the students the opportunity to develop and improve their French speaking skills when discussing their families. Following on from this, each student completed a French speech, delivering their presentation in French to their peers about their families and their pets. The students took this opportunity to build on and improve their spoken French and display their beautiful French accents. This proved a very popular assignment!

With the integration of technology into the classroom occurring at an increasingly earlier stage, it comes as no surprise that the number of girls with an avid interest in technology continues to grow at an exponential rate. The introduction of Language Perfect; a language learning program available to all language students, has been an invaluable tool in reinforcing learned vocabulary, grammar and key themes. The program has enabled our students to practise their French at home on their laptops and build on learned linguistic structures.

Year 9 French elective students have had a busy year completing a variety of assessments and language projects. This Year 9 group of girls are an enthusiastic group of talented and hardworking language students. This year the girls have been given an opportunity to develop their language and grammar skills through learning about French food, French pastimes and composing emails in French. The students are building on their knowledge gained in Year 8. Their assessment tasks have included a focus on French



food and French travel. Being able to speak about and recognise French foods is a useful tool when learning about another country's cultural habits and customs

Year 10 students are always improving their ability and knowledge of spoken and written French. The students completed a very popular speaking and writing fashion task this year in Term 1. All students were required to research and present a PowerPoint presentation on their favourite French fashion designer. This was a very popular research assignment and the girls produced very engaging and visually appealing presentations. Coco Chanel was a favourite!

Using language in authentic contexts enables students to realise the value and the importance of learning a language. The last weeks of Term 2 were an exciting time for French students as all classes had the opportunity to visit Alliance Française in Sydney. Alliance Française is a French language and cultural centre in the heart of the city. The Year 8 students participated in an interactive two hour workshop. The 'Decouverte Culturelle' workshop was an experience involving different cities of France: Marseille, Chamonix and Versailles. Students were put into groups and discovered these well-known regions of France, their traditions, as well as the vocabulary of the mountain and the regions' food specialities.

In Years 9 and 10 the students took part in the Pronunciation Workshop. This two hour lesson is tailored to improve student's pronunciation through games, tongue-twisters and a lot of short, targeted activities. The students really enjoyed listening and speaking in French with the teachers at the Alliance Française. The girls also had a taste of some typical French cuisine where they sampled some beautiful French coffee, crêpes and hot chocolate during the French inspired morning tea. A great day was had by all and every student left with a greater understanding of the French language.

The college celebrated 50 years of Catholic high school education for girls this year and the celebration evening on Thursday 22nd June was a great success. Supported by the choir, the French students', dressed in their red berets sang a beautiful rendition of 'Frère Jacques'. A great soirée was had by all. Bravo les filles!

In Year 12 this year we had one student, Bethany M, completing the Japanese Continuers HSC Course. This is a highly demanding course requiring strong and consistent commitment to learning and studying. It has been a great pleasure to watch Bethany's diligence and effort towards fulfilling her highest potential in this course. In August Bethany completed her oral examination, worth 20% of her mark and sat the remaining listening, writing and reading sections of her examination on October 25th.

Our elective students in Years 9 and 10 have also been working hard to master the new vocabulary, grammar and script required of them each week.

Year 10 have completed a presentation about fashion trends in Japanese. They have gained wonderful insights into the often quirky world of Japanese fashions and displayed their knowledge of the present continuous tense at the same time. Although a small cohort they have become very close. One student, Breanna G, has been living in Nagasaki this year as an exchange student. Her class have been able to Skype with Bree, allowing her to share a little of the Japanese lifestyle and culture she has been experiencing with her fellow students. It has provided a wonderful insight for the students making their learning highly engaging and very realistic.

Year 9 are a very talented and motivated group who have really engaged with learning the new script katakana and expanding their kanji knowledge as well. Their major Semester 2 task was to present their dream weekend away in Japan as a power point, writing what they did and where they went each day in Japanese. They produced some excellent work with wonderful text of which they should be very proud.

Years 9 and 10 students had the wonderful opportunity during Term 1 to visit the Tanken Centre at Kirrawee High School. This purpose built Japanese experience centre replicates a typical Japanese home with tatami floors and paper sliding screens. The students were immersed throughout the day in Japanese culture and language, playing games based on their skills in speaking, listening and reading. It was a highly enjoyable day watching the students respond with growing confidence in Japanese and returning to our college really motivated to increase their knowledge and skills. The day included an obento in the rock garden – a uniquely Japanese experience!

Three classes in Year 8 enjoyed learning Japanese this year. Language learning offers many opportunities for a student to reflect on their own language and place in the world, and to gain appreciation of other nationalities and languages. Amongst their many accomplishments this year, these students have completed wonderful projects researching particular areas within Japan, have given self-introduction speeches in Japanese, gained valuable listening skills, and have learned to read and write an entirely new script in Japanese! Adding to these skills the students have expanded their IT skills, accessing sound files and recording their own sound files using Audacity for their Term 3 task.

During Term 1 Year 8 students participated in a Taiko Drum Workshop with the highly engaging Kiyomi Calwell. Kiyomi was able to lead the students through taiko drumming basics and methods of counting to eventually having the students perform a simple yet dynamic piece. It was a fabulously hands on experience with many commands and counting of rhythms in Japanese. After the workshop the students were able to enjoy beautifully prepared Japanese snack boxes from Midori Japanese Restaurant at Erina. Midori Japanese restaurant is a business run by one of our students' family and is highly recommended with many of the students commenting on their delicious Japanese treats.

During Term 3 we were very fortunate to again have a visit by students from Seigakuin High School, Japan. One lucky Year 8 class spent time getting to know these students by listening to self-introductions, playing Kahoot and musical statues, and eating Japanese senbei (rice crackers) and lamingtons. It was wonderful to see the students mix and attempt to communicate, making friends and enjoying hearing about other students' lifestyles and daily lives. The Seigakuin students had brought our students small gifts of lolly bags and really brought a lot of laughter and smiles to the day. Thank you to all our students who were so welcoming and so eager to engage with our visitors.

Two highlights in Japanese studies this year were our participation during the 50th Year Anniversary Show and our achievements during the Language World Championships.

Each faculty presented a piece for the 50th Year Anniversary Show, with students from the Language faculty singing songs. The Japanese students sang 'Waltzing Matilda' in Japanese. It was simply beautiful to hear and wonderful to see the effort and commitment the students who performed on the night made to rehearse and perform. Our very special thanks go to our college choir master Mr Phil Rees and our college choir, and to Year 9 student Matilda A whose beautiful voice featured on the original Japanese recording of "Waltzing Matilda".

During the two weeks over which the Language World Championships were held we had some very diligent students working hard to answer as many questions as they could. Congratulations go to the following students who excelled and achieved the following levels:

Mathematics



In 2017 we welcomed Mrs Alison Rennie into the Mathematics faculty to take the classes of Mrs Michelle D'Offay whilst on leave during Semester 1. We also welcomed Ms Cherie Gorham who has taken a variety of classes from Years 7 to 9 throughout the year.

2017 has been a busy and interesting year, and included traditional competitions as well as the introduction of new numeracy lessons amongst other exciting and new activities.

The 2016 Year 12 students achieved excellent results in Mathematics in the Higher School Certificate. Once again we had a student attempt the highest level of Mathematics - the Mathematics Extension 2 course, with very pleasing results. In 2017 we have another student attempting this course and have welcomed a student from St Edward's for this coeducational class.

This year saw the introduction of dedicated numeracy lessons for all Year 8 students. During these lessons, students were given the opportunity to develop and strengthen their numeracy skills which enables them to become more self-directed learners. The lessons also had an impact on improving student engagement in Mathematics.

In June five Year 10 girls were given the opportunity to participate in the Year 5 and 6 Enrichment Day held at St Edward's College. Taylor H, Sophie S, Laura M, Madeline S and Zoe R contributed by offering assistance to the Year 5 and 6 students as well as participating in the Mathematics activities and challenges. These Year 10 girls proudly represented the college through their impeccable conduct, teamwork, problem-solving skills and inclusive attitude.

Some of our Year 11 students had fun performing in and filming a skit for the college 50th birthday celebrations showcase. The light-hearted video highlighted the changes in the ways Mathematics is used and taught in the classroom now compared to 50 years ago and accented the difference that modern technology has made to teaching this subject.

Akela P did a wonderful job directing, filming and editing the video for the Mathematics department.

In July, Year 7 investigated problems from the World of Maths. The interactive problems provided excellent opportunities for Year 7 to explore and extend their thinking skills.

Students from Years 7 to 10 were invited to compete in the Mathematics International Competitions and Assessment for Schools (ICAS) in August this year. The competition and assessment is run not only in Australia but in many schools around the world. It is a great way for our students to compete in an international arena and not surprisingly they achieved excellent results. We thank the girls for their dedication and commitment to doing their best in the ICAS and we commend them for their amazing achievements.

Mathematics tutorials continue to run on Wednesday afternoons. This is an important resource and is available to students in all year groups. The tutorials provide the opportunity for students to consolidate each day's mathematical concepts and is highly valued by the Mathematics staff. Not surprisingly, the tutorial sessions are encouraged and extremely popular just prior to assessment tasks and examinations.

The support of Mrs Tracy Simpson and her Learning Support team is a welcome addition to any Mathematics class. Their assistance enhances student's ability to overcome difficulties as they are encountered. This fosters improved understanding and greater achievement. Their contact with classes across Years 7 to 10 is a vital link in developing each student's mathematical skills.

In PDHPE we have had a highly successful year and some major events taking place. In August Year 7 participated in Jump Rope For Heart which involved students registering to raise funds for the Heart Foundation. This event also raises awareness of the prevalence of heart disease in Australia, supports research and encourages lifelong physical activity. The total amount raised by Year 7 this year was \$6,557.40, which exceeded funds raised in 2016. The funds raised by the students at St Joseph's this year will help support life-saving research and health programs to improve the heart health of all Australians. A special mention must go to Amy B and Hannah R who raised over \$500 each. We thank Mrs Kelleher who organises and facilitates this great event each year and all the families and friends who supported the St Joseph's students in this event.

Year 10 went to Qudos Bank Arena on Tuesday 17th August to attend the BSTREETSMART forum. This was organised by the Trauma Service at Westmead Hospital and involved interactive displays from CareFlight, NSW Ambulance, Fire and Police Services and St John's Ambulance to name a few. Keynote speakers related their personal experiences from road trauma incidents leading to permanent disabilities and brain traumas. This year the presentation included a session on the trauma unit in the hospitals. It was an amazing forum raising community awareness about injury prevention and trauma care services, particularly to this age group entering 'driver' eligibility.

The biathlon event for Stage 5 PSS students took place in Gosford, which involved Year 10 PSS organise and conduct the event and included participants from Year 9 testing their fitness skills following an intensive fitness program.

Year 11 PDHPE classes once again engaged in the outdoor education experience at Foster/Tuncurry National Park focusing on teamwork and problem solving. The challenges of mountain biking, canoeing, hiking and surfing were presented to the girls who all responded positively resulting in an outstanding three day adventure.

Year 12 PDHPE classes combined with Biology students to attend the Museum of Human Disease at the University of NSW. At the museum, the students viewed a collection of 3,000 specimens of human tissue. Each specimen is accompanied by a clinical history and some specimens are over 100 years old. The museum contains examples of both infectious and non-infectious diseases and houses exhibits on smoking, obesity, alcohol, drugs and mental health.

Science











With another busy year coming to a close it is time to reflect on the year's activities.

The Science faculty highlights for 2017 include the incursions and excursion attended by our students and how much they gained from these experiences.

National Science Week in August is always special for us with so many activities and fabulous visitors. During this week students engaged with the Education Perfect International Science Challenge which saw them competing against students from all over Australia and the rest of the world answering as many Science questions as they could during the week. The results were as follows:

- St Joseph's Catholic College came first in the Diocese of Broken Bay winning the championship trophy for the second year running and finishing 27th in the global competition out of 1,281 schools.
- The top performing class across the Diocese was Mrs Moutray's 9 Science 1 who won a \$100 lunch voucher.
- Students achieved fifteen credit, eleven bronze, four silver, and six gold awards which was an increase on last year's results.
- St Joseph's students answered 166,901 questions, earned 95,936 points and spent 599 hours online over the course of the competition.
- A very special mention to Jess T who came first in the diocese winning herself a medal and a \$60 'Mad about Science' voucher and Freyja K who came second in the diocese winning a \$40 'Mad About Science' voucher.

Congratulations to all participants on an awesome effort.

We had three ex-students come to the college to talk about their work and careers in science and medicine:

- Dr Katie Dixon, who is a research scientist at Sydney University.
 Dr Dixon's work is in the effects of UV on skin cancer and how it can be prevented.
- Lauren Stone, who is in the final year of her degree in medicine.
- Emily White who is a paediatric emergency nurse.

The students were able to ask questions of these amazing ex-students about their careers, life, plans for the future and gained an in insight into how they also could follow a career in Science and Medicine.

The Australian Reptile Park visited our Year 7 students for their studies in classification. They met some of the park's residents, including Rosie the crocodile who enjoyed a good wander around the classroom. One of the keepers is also an ex-student of St Joseph's, normally working with the mammal population of the park. She was excited to head back to her old school for a visit and talk to the students.

Mitchell from 'Kaleidoscope Science' brought the Great Big Science Show to St Joseph's for Year 9. The students were entertained by lots of explosions and of course liquid nitrogen - they had a great time.

Other excursions included Year 11 Biology heading over to the St Edward's grounds to the mangroves as part of their local ecosystem study. They collected a range of data about the mangrove environment and the organisms that live there.

Science





Year 12 Biology and Senior Science students went to the Museum of Human Disease at the University of NSW along with PDHPE students. The students attended workshops for their studies in "Search for Better Health" and "Bionics". They were able to meet current medical students and practising doctors who helped to guide them around the museum.

Year 10 students competed in the coast-wide Science and Engineering Challenge competing against other schools from the central coast.

Year 11 Senior Science students visited the Central Coast Council Nursery to observe the germination and propagation techniques used on Australian native plants.

Year 12 Chemistry students spent the day at Newcastle University's Ourimbah campus for the annual ExperimentFest. They were able to work in the university laboratories alongside other students from around the coast.

Year 12 Physics students spent the day at the University of Sydney for the Kick Start Physics program. They also enjoyed a night under the stars with Year 11 Physics class for the annual astronomy night.

Year 11 Science students are eligible to apply to attend the National Youth Science Forum, which is held every year in January. It is highly competitive with students from all around Australia being eligible to apply. There are often over 2000 applications for a total of 400 places. This year four of our students have gained a place after a very challenging application process including many rounds of interviews. The girls are Natasha M, Molly F, Sarah K and Elana C. This is an amazing result for the girls and for the college.

TAS



































St Joseph's Technology and Applied Studies (TAS) program provides students with the skills necessary to successfully work and respond within our rapidly changing world.

Areas of study within TAS include Technology Mandatory, Food Technology, Textiles and Design, Exploring Early Childhood, Community and Family Studies and Industrial Technology-Timber. Our students benefit from a range of TAS facilities, including a commercial standard kitchen, well-appointed timber workshop, multipurpose rooms and the recent purchase of a laser cutter.

TECHNOLOGY MANDATORY

The development of creative thinking skills is central to the Years 7 and 8 Technology mandatory course. Students are encouraged to develop skills in organisation and initiative by working through design briefs using a range of technologies. Several new topics were explored this year including the timber collection and jazzy jewellery. Each student produced a practical item and also a comprehensive folio.

FOOD TECHNOLOGY

Food Technology is an elective subject in Year 9 through to Year 12 where the students learn about a range of issues related to food and nutrition. Topics include hygiene and safety, the nutritional quality of food, access to a regular food supply and the environmental impact of food production processes are examined as part of the course. Students also explored food-related issues through a range of practical experiences, allowing them to make informed and appropriate choices with regards to food.

TEXTILES TECHNOLOGY AND TEXTILES AND DESIGN

Textiles Technology is offered in Years 9 and 10 and Textiles and Design is offered in Years 11 and 12. The students in these subjects are challenged to work creatively within the field of textiles building upon skills taught in the Year 8 Technology mandatory course to produce practical work and folios to a high standard.

TIMBER TECHNOLOGY

This course builds upon the foundation laid by the timber collection in Year 8 and carries into Years 9 and 10. Students in Years 11 and 12 are offered the HSC Industrial Technology Timber course. The students in these courses have produced many innovative and exceptionally designed timber projects over the years. The purchase of a laser cutter has increased creativity and built on the standard of excellence already established in these subjects at the college.

EXPLORING EARLY CHILDHOOD

Exploring Early Childhood is a two unit course offered to Stage 6 students and involves studying the topic of childhood from pregnancy to school age. The students take home computerised babies to practice parenting skills and this year also had the opportunity to interact with 2018 Kindergarten students at St Patrick's Primary School East Gosford. This opportunity gave the students a chance to implement their positive interaction skills with the pre-schoolers.

COMMUNITY AND FAMILY STUDIES

This course is offered in Stage 6 where students learn about individuals and groups in society. The marginalised are studied as well as parenting and caring strategies. The completion of an independent research project helps ready the students for tertiary studies and research.

Careers & VET



















2017 has been a busy and eventful year for students studying VET courses at St Joseph's. Students have had the opportunity to undertake study in three framework courses: Business Services, Hospitality and Retail Services. At the completion of the courses, the students are eligible to receive either a Statement of Attainment; Certificate I; Certificate II or Certificate III. These courses contribute two units towards HSC and also towards ATAR.

The mandatory 70 hour work placement component of the courses taken over two years allows students to work and experience real life industry placement where they are expected to perform tasks and use the skills and knowledge that they have acquired in the classroom. This has proven to be a very worthwhile and sometimes a daunting experience for students and employers alike as they gain first-hand experience of the world of employment. Several of our students were fortunate to have gained part-time employment as a result of these experiences.

I would like to extend my thanks to all of the employers who hosted our students throughout the year. They not only give their time but also their own expertise, knowledge and skills that are required in the world of employment. Students are then able to bring these skills into the classroom as well as their own lives outside of school.

Year 11 students participated in a work readiness program at school which assisted them with appropriate dress, their rights and responsibilities at work, work health and safety in the workplace and helpful hints to support them in the workplace.

Several students participated in TVET courses at Ourimbah and Gosford TAFE Colleges. Subjects studied included Animal Care; Tourism and Early Childhood Education. Several students also attended classes at Gosford Hospital in Health Services Assistance. Georgia A of Year 12 graduated this year with a Certificate III in Health Services Assistance.

McDonalds and KFC retail traineeships were also popular with students undertaking paid work and study towards their HSC.

Hospitality students competed in the Battle of the Chefs competition and Business Services students competed in the World Skills competition this year. Congratulations and well done to these students.

The Careers Education program again allowed every student in Year 10 the opportunity to participate in one Careers Education lesson per cycle. This assisted students to be more aware of subject selections going into Year 11. They visited the Western Sydney Careers Expo and next year will have the opportunity to visit the Central Coast Careers Expo at Cooranbong.

The Year 12 students attended the Central Coast Careers Expo at Cooranbong and had visits from several universities who spoke about life after Year 12, subjects, scholarships, accommodation and university life in general.

The students have access to Careers Corner through the library portal giving the students the most up to date careers news as it becomes available.






